## Transferring to Francis Marion University

At Francis Marion University we help you hit what you aim for by providing easy transfer. Whether you're transferring from one of the 16 South Carolina technical colleges or another postsecondary institution, we hope this brochure will assist you as you make plans to attend FMU. If you have questions, please call the Admissions Office at 843-661-1231 or 800-368-7551. The staff will be happy to help you as you plan your course of study. If you are transferring from a technical or community college in another state or from another four-year institution, your academic work will be evaluated on an individual course basis. Otherwise, the transfer policies outlined in this publication apply.

## **About Francis Marion University**

Francis Marion University was founded in 1970 and is one of South Carolina's 13 four-year, state-supported universities. FMU is named in honor of Revolutionary War hero, General Francis Marion, who was nicknamed the Swamp Fox for using the South Carolina terrain to outfox the British. Enrolling more than 4,000 students, the university offers a broad range of degrees and a select number of graduate programs. FMU is located about seven miles east of Florence in the beautiful Pee Dee region of the state. The campus is situated on 400 wooded acres and features modern classroom buildings, laboratories, and residence halls to provide a safe, comfortable learning environment for students. The campus also features a number of recreational facilities that are available for use by students, faculty, staff, and alumni and for use in intramural and intercollegiate athletic competitions. FMU is a member of the NCAA and the Peach Belt Conference. With two sports transitioning from Division I to Division I membership, plans have been discussed to possibly move the entire athletics program to Division I membership in the next few years.

Prospective students are encouraged to visit FMU. Campus tours are conducted Monday through Friday at 11 a.m. and 1 p.m. From Sept 1 until May 1, tours are also offered on select Saturdays. Appointments should be made for all tours. Although interviews are not a part of the admissions process, transfer applicants are encouraged to make an appointment to discuss transfer opportunities with an Admissions Counselor. The university recognizes the value of a diverse transfer population and welcomes your application.

### **Costs of Attendance**

Educational costs at Francis Marion University are among the lowest in South Carolina making FMU one of the best educational buys for out-of-state students. FMU's tuition and required fees for a typical full-time South Carolina student are \$3,816.00 per semester, while costs for a typical out-of-state student total \$7,489.50 per semester.

## Phi Theta Kappa Scholarship

Two renewable \$1,000 scholarships are awarded per year to members of Phi Theta Kappa Honor Society who transfer to FMU. Students must have a 3.25 cumulative GPA at the institution where they are members of Phi Theta Kappa. The scholarships are renewable each year with the completion of 30 hours with a 3.0 GPA. Applications are available online at www.fmarion.edu or may be requested from the Admissions Office. All applications must be received by February 1.

#### **Residence Life**

Housing is available for students in FMU's residence halls and apartments. Rooms and apartments are clean, safe, and comfortable. All are fully air-conditioned. Residence hall rooms are configured in a suite arrangement. Housing is available for approximately 1,500 residents. Applications for housing will be sent to you with your acceptance letter. If you plan to live on campus, please apply early to ensure your place.

## **Transfer Application Process**

Transfer students are individuals who have earned a high school diploma or its equivalent and have subsequently attended a college or university in a full-time or part-time status during a regular semester.

To apply for admission to Francis Marion University as a transfer student you should:

- Complete an application for admission and mail it with the \$30 application fee to the Office of Admissions.
- Have official transcripts sent directly to the Admissions Office from the registrar's office of each
  college you have attended. All official transcripts must be submitted even if you do not expect to
  receive credit for the work or if you withdrew prior to receiving final grades.

If you have been provisionally accepted, you must arrange for FMU to receive updated transcripts for any additional work you complete. Also, you must also submit **official** copies of your high school transcripts, including SAT scores to the Admissions Office. High school transcripts may be obtained from your former high school.

### **Transfer Admissions Requirements**

To be considered for admission as a transfer student, you should have completed 22 transferable hours of college work and earned a cumulative grade point average of at least a 2.0

If you have less than 22 hours of transferable course work, the Admissions Committee may review your file based on all your academic performance including high school GPA and SAT scores.

If you have earned an AA or AS degree and transfer directly to FMU, you will be automatically admitted.

All applications are reviewed on a rolling basis as they become complete. At that time we will make one of the following decisions:

- YES. You have been accepted. If you are currently enrolled in a postsecondary institution, your
  acceptance will be provisional based on the successful completion of the courses in which you are
  currently enrolled.
- NO. Your academic credentials do not meet current admission requirements. However, we will be
  happy to advise you as you work toward admission to FMU by suggesting additional coursework at
  another institution.

#### **Evaluation of Transfer Credits**

Once all your transcripts are in and you are accepted, your academic credits will be evaluated by the Registrar's Office. A copy of your evaluation will be mailed both to you and to your academic advisor. Courses in which you have earned a grade of C or higher are considered for transfer credit. FMU does not transfer grades, only credits; therefore, you will enter FMU without a grade point average. No credit will be transferred for correspondence courses taught on a pass/fail or satisfactory/unsatisfactory grading scale. Your class standing is determined as follows:

#### Class Standing Number of Credits Transferred

Freshman Earned less than 22 semester hours
Sophomore Earned at least 22 but less than 54 semester hours
Junior Earned at least 54 but less than 87 semester hours
Senior Earned at least 87 or more semester hours

It is important to note that even though a course may be acceptable as a transfer course, it might not be applicable to a specific FMU major, program, or degree. No more than 65 semester hours of credit may be accepted from institutions accredited as junior colleges or two-year institutions.

#### **Hours in Residence**

In order to complete requirements for an undergraduate degree, a transfer student must earn at least 36 semester hours of work in residence at Francis Marion University (including a minimum of three courses above the 299 level in your major within five calendar years preceding the date the degree is granted).

Grade points from other institutions are not reflected in the cumulative totals; these are used only at graduation to compute honors. To graduate cum laude, magna cum laude or summa cum laude, a transfer student must complete a minimum of 60 semester hours at FMU.

#### **Academic Renewal**

If you have been a Francis Marion student in the past but have not been enrolled for at least three consecutive years, you might be readmitted under the Academic Renewal policy. The intent of the policy is to provide a fresh start for you if you experienced academic difficulty during your initial enrollment at FMU. You may pick up an application for Academic Renewal in the Registrar's Office.

#### Individuals with Disabilities

Effort will be made to ensure that classes and programs will be accessible to individuals with disabilities. If you plan to enroll and require assistance relating to a disability, please contact the Office of Counseling and Testing at 843 661-1840 at least 10 days prior to the beginning of the semester.
