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### Transfer Guidelines for MHCC Elementary Education Students.

The following transferable courses are recommended to satisfy both the State of Oregon ECE/Elementary Teaching license, and General Education Core Requirements at Warner Pacific College. MHCC offers no courses that will satisfy the teacher training (pedagogy) course required by the State of Oregon. Please note that WPC also accepts then Oregon Transfer Degree (A.A.) from MHCC in place of most of WPC's General Education Core Requirements. **MATHEMATICS:**

6 semester credits of any Math Choose one course from MTH 095 or higher. number 100 or higher.

MTH 211, 212, and 213 recommended. (any 9 quarter credits of Math numbered 100 or higher are acceptable).

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**SCIENCE:**

4 semester credits with regular lab experience. One lab science course.

Any two science courses (need not be a series). At least one course must have an accompanying lab.

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**SOCIAL SCIENCE:**

One course in General Psychology, one course in Cultural Geography, plus 5 semester hours in social science electives that deal with humans as individuals. Two courses from two different fields.

PSY 201 or 202 or 203; GEOG 107; plus, select 9 quarter credits from: BI 231, 232, 233; FN 225; PSY 214, 216, 231, 232, 239; SOC 223, 225.

**HEALTH/PHYSICAL ED:**

One Health/Wellness course, plus two PE experiences. One Health/Wellness course plus two PE experiences.

HE 250 and two PE 185 activity classes OR HPE 295 and one PE 185 activity class.

**FINE ARTS :**

Two semester credits from Art, Drama, Fine Arts, or Music, emphasizing the Cultural/Historical aspects of the art form. Four semester credits from Art, Drama, Fine Arts or Music. One course chosen must emphasize the cultural/historical aspects of the art form. Additional course(s) must be participatory or performance oriented.

Three quarter hours selected from: ART 167, 201, 202, 203, 211, 212, 213. MUS 101, 205, 208, 261, 262, 263. TA 101, 102, 103.

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The application process to the Teacher Education Program usually occurs during the first semester at WPC. Full acceptance into the Program is achieved after the student demonstrates professional attributes and skills. Students may take the Teacher Education course before full acceptance into the Program, but official acceptance must be completed prior to the student teaching semesters.

Program Acceptance Requirements:

1. Completed Application to the Teacher Education Program.
2. Four references, including three from WPC faculty members.
3. A minimum cumulative college GPA of 2.5 required, OR GPA of 3.0 or better in the first semester at WPC. (Students must achieve a 2.75 minimum GPA before student teaching).
4. Passing scores on acceptable basic skills assessments exam (e.g. CBEST, PPST, certain PRAXIS exams)
