

Articulation Agreement (Executive Summary)

Carroll Community College A.A. Business Administration – Management Information Systems

University of Maryland Baltimore County B.A. Business Technology Administration

The purpose of this articulation agreement is to establish collaboration between UMBC and CCC in an effort to facilitate the transfer and degree completion of students earning the A.A. in Business Administration – Management Information Systems at CCC to the B.A. Business Technology Administration at UMBC.

General Requirements

- All courses meeting general education requirements at CCC will transfer and be applied towards the general education requirements at UMBC
- A maximum of 60 credits will transfer from CCC, a two-year degree-granting institution
- Upon matriculation to UMBC, CCC students must satisfy all general education, graduation and major requirements as outlined in the UMBC undergraduate catalog
- CCC students must take a minimum of 30 credit hours at UMBC to earn a bachelor's degree. The final 30 credits must be earned at UMBC
- UMBC requires a minimum of 120 credit hours to attain a bachelor's degree (includes CCC transfer credits)
- At least 45 of a student's 120 credits required for a bachelor's degree must be in courses designated at upper-level. At UMBC, this is indicated by a -300 or -400 course number
- Courses from CCC judged to be equivalent to upper-level UMBC courses will be counted toward the upper-level graduation requirement

Advising and Academic Planning

- Students are advised to work closely with an academic advisor at CCC to develop an academic plan that ensures seamless transition to UMBC.
- Following admission to UMBC, students will receive an evaluation of prior college coursework that includes transferability and applicability to UMBC general and university requirements.
- Prior to matriculation to UMBC, all new students are required to attend the mandatory new student orientation program
- Upon matriculation, students will be assigned an advisor in their area of study

Admission

- Applicants successfully completing the articulation program with a 2.0 or better grade point average and who have not matriculated at any other institution of higher education will be guaranteed transfer admission to UMBC
- Additional requirements may apply on selective admissions programs (Engineering, Visual and Performing Arts)
- A history of acts identified in the Federal Campus Security Act may disqualify a candidate for guaranteed admission

Scholarships and Financial Aid

- Transfer students who meet application deadlines, academic and financial qualifications that apply to all students may be eligible for consideration for a variety of merit-based scholarships offered by UMBC
- To maximize consideration for need-based aid, students are encouraged to complete the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) as soon as possible after January 1, but prior to February 14 for fall admission
