Students anticipating transferring to UNL's Education and Human Sciences College (Department of Nutrition and Health Sciences) may use this guide for selecting Metropolitan Community College courses. Check the UNL Bulletin http://bulletin.unl.edu/undergraduate/index.shtml) for information about specific curriculum requirements or check the website at EDUCATION AND HUMAN SCIENCES (http://cehs.unl.edu/). This guide incorporates the degree requirements as stated in the University Bulletin. Degree requirements may change each academic year. Students interested in transferring to UNL should communicate regularly with a UNL academic adviser to confirm course selections. To contact an academic adviser in the Education and Human Sciences College call (402-472-8624). To facilitate the transfer of credit, all grades should be a "C" or higher. The University of Nebraska - Lincoln applies a maximum of 66 semester hours (99 quarter hours) in transfer from community colleges toward a UNL degree. To facilitate the transfer of hours, all grades should be a "C" or higher.

IMPORTANT CHANGE: Beginning Fall Semester 2012 UNL will apply 60 semester hours or 90 quarter hours from community colleges toward a UNL degree

This Transfer Guide recommends courses that fulfill the stated requirement in the most majors. The Nutrition and Health Sciences Department Offers the Following Majors: * Athletic Training Education (requires 4-year sequence of courses once students transfer to UNL) * Dietetics * Culinary Science (Culinology TM) * Hospitality, Restaurant and Tourism Management * Nutrition Science * Dietetics/Journalism and Mass Communications * Nutrition Exercise and

Achievement-Centered Education (ACE) is the UNL general education curriculum. Students must complete at least one 3 hour course to meet the ACE outcome described below. A course may only apply to one outcome. Following is a list of ACE courses recommended for students planning on majoring in this UNL college. The transfer guides vary significantly by UNL college. Thus students considering more than one major should consult the guides for all of the colleges they are considering. Courses may apply to only one ACE outcome. The UNL course numbers are in [] behind the credit hours:

ACE 1 (Complete 3 semester hours minimum): Write texts, in various forms, with an identified purpose, that respond to specific audience needs, incorporate research or existing knowledge, and use applicable documentation and appropriate conventions of format and structure. If your school does not offer courses for the ACE 1 requirement, take the requirement at UNL

ACE 2 (3 semester hours minimum): Demonstrate communication competence in one or more of the following ways: (a) by making oral presentations with supporting materials, (b) by leading and participating in problem-solving teams, (c) by employing a repertoire of communication skills for developing and maintaining professional and personal relationships, or (d) by creating and interpreting visual information. If your school does not offer courses for the ACE 2 requirement, take the requirement at UNL.

ACE 3: (5-6 semester hours minimum): Use mathematical, computational, statistical, or formal reasoning (including reasoning based on principles of logic) to solve problems, draw inferences, and determine reasonableness. 1)
Hospitality, Restaurant and Tourism Management students should consult with an UNL adviser before taking math, 2) Athletic Training majors need Trigonometry (2 cr) and an additional course that must be completed at UNL, 3)
Nutrition, Exercise and Health Science majors should have College Algebra (equivalent of UNL's Math 101) (3 cr) and an additional course that must be completed at UNL. All other programs require a minimum of 3 semester hours of precalculus (college algebra) and 3 semester hours of statistics (equivalent of UNL's STAT 218). If your school does not offer courses for the ACE 3 requirement, take the requirement at UNL.

ACE 4: (Minimum of 4 semester hours): Use scientific methods and knowledge of the natural and physical world to address problems through inquiry, interpretation, analysis, and the making of inferences from data, to determine whether conclusions or solutions are reasonable. All programs require the equivalent of UNL's CHEM 109 and CHEM 110. Dietetics, the Journalism option and Athletic Training also require the equivalent of UNL's BIOS 101. Majors in this department are science intensive. Thus students will need additional science courses at UNL. If your school does not offer courses for the ACE 4 requirement, take the requirement at UNL.

ACE 5: (3 semester hours minimum): Use knowledge, historical perspectives, analysis, interpretation, critical evaluation, and the standards of evidence appropriate to the humanities to address problems and issues. Hospitality, Restaurant and Tourism Management students should complete this requirement at UNL. If your school does not offer courses for the ACE 5 requirement, take the requirement at UNL

ACE 6 (6-7 semester hours minimum): Use knowledge, theories, methods, and historical perspectives appropriate to the social sciences to understand and evaluate human behavior. We recommend students complete the ACE 6 requirement at UNL.

ACE 7 (3 semester hours minimum): Use knowledge, theories, or methods appropriate to the arts to understand their context and significance. If your school does not offer courses for the ACE 7 requirement, take the requirement at

ACE 8 (3 semester hours minimum): Explain ethical principles, civics, and stewardship, and their importance to society. Culinary Science and Hospitality, Restaurant and Tourism Management require the equivalent of UNL's ECON 211 and 212. If your school does not offer courses for the ACE 8 requirement, take the requirement at UNL.

ACE 9 (3 semester hours minimum): Exhibit global awareness or knowledge of human diversity through analysis of an issue. We recommend students complete the ACE 9 requirement at UNL.

If your school does not offer courses for this requirement, take the requirement at UNL.
FOREIGN LANGUAGE: Programs offered by the College of Education and Human Sciences do not have a graduation foreign language requirement beyond the UNL admission requirement—two units (2 years in high school or two semesters in college) of foreign language in the same language. If your school does not offer courses for the foreign language requirement, take the requirement at UNL.

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
