Transfer students are admitted on a very selective basis. A strong scholastic background, both in achievement level and curriculum selection, is essential. Transfer Students may be admitted, if space is available, if they have grades of C or higher in one 3-hour mathematics course (equivalent to MATH 105, MATH 106, or MATH 115) and one 4-hour physics course with laboratory (equivalent to PHYS 114) and have overall grade-point average of 3.5.

All <u>complete applications</u> for summer and fall are considered on February 1 (October 1 for spring). Materials should be mailed far in advance to insure that we receive them by the deadline. Applications received after the deadlines will be considered, but are less likely to be accepted due to space limitations.
