Student Teaching requires a minimum PSU cumulative grade point average of 2.70.

Students also must have earned a minimum C grade in all Social Studies Content disciplines (AN, EC, EPL, GE, HI, PO, PS, SO, TMP) and Social Studies Education (SSE) courses.

Students must have completed 18 credits in a single Concentration discipline through combined core and upper-level courses (not including Directions courses).

Students must take the Praxis I exam prior to admission to PSU and must successfully complete the exam before graduation from the two-year institution. Students shall also submit their Praxis I results to Plymouth State.

Students with the AA degree in Teacher Preparation must have a minimum cumulative grade point average of 2.50.
